Revised statutory guidance

The Department for Education has released an updated version of its report outlining the requirements of schools to provide independent careers guidance to students. Professor Tristram Hooley has produced a policy commentary announcing the changes for schools, which places an emphasis on high quality, independent, face to face careers advice and highlights the importance of career advisers holding relevant professional qualifications. A separate publication for **colleges and sixth forms** is also available.

Careers England launches its election manifesto

Careers England is pleased that the current government has confirmed its dedication to CEIAG with the revised statutory guidance but as always there is still work to be done in terms of funding commitments. We have launched our manifesto to influence whoever is in power from May, which outlines our recommendations for individuals and businesses and calls for an investment of £100m from government. Online resource to help young people decide on their future

A central list of post-16 courses which will make it easier for young people to make choices about their future has moved a step closer to reality following the publication of a guide for providers. From September 2015, the post-16 courses database will hold comprehensive details of education and training courses across the country. The operational guide sets out the information education and training providers must supply for the database.

ASCL launches Foundation Code for CEIAG

Schools, colleges and other learning providers are being urged to adopt a six-point plan, launched by the Association of Schools and Colleges (ASCL), to give young people careers education and advice which will equip them for the complex demands of work in the 21st century.

The Foundation Code has been developed by eight organisations which represent schools, colleges and other learning providers across England. It is aimed at ensuring young people are given the highest quality careers education, information, advice and guidance. Find out more and read the code here.

A new <u>report</u> from IPPR suggests that upper-secondary schooling system in England today is confusing and fragmented. 'Moving on up: Developing a strong, coherent upper-secondary education system in England' sets out a vision for 14–19 education that is more effective at guiding young people through the vital transition to adulthood, higher education, further training and employment.
